
#### **Tim Martin appointed as GELK**

Just a reminder - our fund raising deadline does not conclude at the same time as the lodge year ends. The Piggy Bank collection effort continues until the Association convention in May. The District and Lodge Piggy Bank Chairs will be asking you for that little bit more (or a lot more if you are so inclined) for this year. If we can collect that much money by May 20th, 2011, it would be two years in a row! How exciting it would be to see that we go over \$3 million again!

If you haven't looked at the CHEA website lately (www.chea-elks.org), take a few moments to check it out. Go there then click on the words "Major Project" right above the purple "Donate Now" box. This page has suggestions for using the articles found there to help raise your donations and your member's awareness of the program. It also has articles by month. Many of these articles are thank you notes from parents about our program and the therapist who is working with the family. They are heartwarming and informative snapshots of how we are helping them. After you read some of them, go back to the Home page and click on the purple Donate Now button. There is a simple form to fill out to make a donation and you and your lodge will receive credit for each donation made.

If you decide you wish to make a recurring donation each month, instructions are on the page to enable you to help Piggy Bank that way. Currently we have 14 members that make recurring donations (that is out of 90,000 members). PLEASE sign up for recurring donations! It's an easy way to donate to Piggy Bank and if even ½ of our members (22,500 members) would donate \$5 a month, the Piggy Bank would have \$1,350,000.00 a year! We can generate over \$1 Million for \$5 a month from ½ of our members. See how EASY that would be—you sign up once and it's taken care of for you and for our kids!

I know the economy has been an issue over the last couple of years and I want to thank every member and friend that has donated to the Piggy Bank. Our program is life changing and so worthwhile. Your continued support tells me that you believe this to be true. My heartfelt thanks to all of you!

I have been honored to be your Association Piggy Bank Chair for the last three years. Bill Williford from the Carmichael Lodge will be taking over as chairman at the end of this year's convention. I am sure you will all support him and the program as you have always done in the past.



William coordinated with the City of Napa, the Parks and Recreation Department and the Army Corps of Engineers (who oversee any project that might affect the flood control barriers along the Napa River.) He redesigned the flag holders several times, raised funds for materials and built and supervised their construction and installation. The flag holders will be used during commemorative events at Veterans Park. He was responsible for hundreds of hours of labor on behalf of this project.

Jeffery Sharp's project enhances the safety of those who use the Garfield Baseball Fields and protects the adjoining neighbors' properties. He worked with the Department of Parks and Recreation to build a 100 foot long fence that defines the walkway along the entrance to the baseball field parking areas. The fence protects adults and children from vehicles that enter and exit the parking area and also keeps vehicles from parking on or damaging the private properties adjacent to the parking areas. He was responsible for hundreds of hours of labor on behalf of this project.

The City of Napa and County Board of Supervisors made special presentations. The Lodge was represented by ER Bob Price and ERelect Kristy Wallstrum, Leading Knight. Troop 832 presently has 42 member Scouts and closed out the year 2010 with Courts of Honor for four new Eagles.

"Hi" to all you good people in the world of Elkdom. This past February 5th, many of your dedicated Scholarship Committee members from Lodges across California assembled at the CHEA office in Fresno to begin the tremendous job of judging all of the Most Valuable Student (MVS) applications. This year, the Lodges in California and Hawaii received a total of 2,687 applications. This figure does not include all of the Vocational Grant applications that were received by

the Lodges - which would increase the above number significantly. Out of these 2,687 applications, 195 boys and 195 girls were advanced for judging at the CHEA office in Fresno.

Thirty One (31) volunteer judges were assembled from various District and Lodge Scholarship Committees. In addition, we had some spouses of these judges who performed the important duty of "runners" - keeping the applications moving along the judging "assembly line." Plus the regular staff of the CHEA office that performed the important work of inputting the final information into the computer and helping with their good advice.

After all the judging was complete, seventy three (73) student applications were advanced to the national level. For your information, all student applicants who reached the national level should have been notified by letter on or before March 1st, 2011 as to the status of their applications. Winners of CHEA awards will be sent a Verification Form and instructions on how to receive their awards. Those that were advanced for national judging will be notified by the Elks National Foundation Office.

For the coming fiscal year, the Grand Lodge has budgeted \$2,296,000 for the MVS program to be used for granting 500 4-year scholarships. In addition, \$350,000 has been budgeted for Emergency Education Grants — this money is earmarked for 1-year grants for students of totally disabled Elks. Finally, the Grand Lodge budgeted \$1,000,000 for 250 4-year, \$4,000 scholarships for children and grandchildren of Elks in good standing (Legacy Awards).

In closing, I would like to thank all of those who participated in this year's judging and give a particular thanks to those wonderful people in the CHEA Office under the direction of Executive Director and PSP Tim Martin, Cindy Mowrey and Charise Williams.

#### **Drug Awareness**

Drug abuse has moved beyond the illegal narcotics which have long been the subject of America's War on Drugs. Recent studies show that abuse of prescription drugs, underage alcohol abuse and performance enhancing drugs pose an equal or greater threat to today's youth and young adults.

The Elks have joined the battle with a vigorous program to increase awareness of the dangers of drug abuse

through a combination of community and youth education. The goal of the program is prevention; to help youth decide not to abuse drugs and to recognize that abuse of any substance can have adverse mental and/or physical consequences.

Accordingly, the Elks program is endeavoring to reach youth starting in the third grade and to recognize individuals in the community who are contributors to Drug Awareness through a variety of contests and awards. The program actively involves parents, teachers, community drug agencies, the media and other concerned citizens.

The Elks Drug Awareness program is a perfect addition to many existing youth programs which may already exist in your Lodge, such as the common practice of combining Drug Awareness literature or bookmarks with your dictionary program. Part of the drug awareness program can be incorporated into virtually any activity which involves the youth of your communities. For example, many inexpensive items can be ordered and distributed at parades, or given to all participants in contests such as the hoop shoot or soccer shoot.

Information is available on the CHEA website in the Drug Awareness section describing how to order pamphlets, brochures and other Drug Awareness products. Your County Health Department and local Law Enforcement Agencies are generally very willing to provide information on Drug Awareness efforts and community needs.

Our California-Hawaii Elks Association goal is to be a support group for Drug Awareness Programs, and other community involved groups. In the current economic times many community programs have been eliminated or reduced; if this is true in your community, our Lodges need to be the leaders in forming Drug Awareness Groups and programs.

The Elks are committed to eliminating the use and abuse of illegal drugs by all members of society and believe that in order to ensure a bright future for our country, it is essential that our children be raised in a drugfree environment.
