Alexis thanked all of the members of the California-Hawaii Elks Association for all that we have done for her. She then sang a song for us. What was truly amazing was Alexis had to time her singing with the venelator pump that helps her breath. This was the first time that many of us had ever had the opportunity to see the long term results of our donations. Below is her story today.

# My Inspirational Story By Alexis Booth



My name is Alexis Booth and I'm 21 yrs My old. life had its has ups and downs, but, I wouldn't have had it any other way. This is my life story and hopefully will people have a better

understanding of me and what kind of person I am.

Some people think it's easy for me to do all the things I do, but it hasn't been a "walk in the park." When I was two the doctors told my parents that I only had six months to live. The cysts in my Cervical Spine and Brainstem had been growing since I was born and I had multiple brain surgeries to drain them. I also had Meningitis and that made everything worse. I am paralyzed on my left side of my body, because my Brainstem is so damaged it's surprising I'm even moving. I like to think things happen for a reason and that I wouldn't be here if it weren't for my family being there every step of the way and not giving up.

I always thought of myself as a fighter and determined to do anything that I can set my mind to do. I did cheerleading for six years,

and I continue to be involved in cheerleading by being a coach. Last year, my mom and I took the girls to Florida for Nationals, and the girls had a blast. Its things like this that I love because I'm making somebody's day special. I also go on rollercoasters, play with my brothers and sisters. I love going to school and homework. I am now currently going to college at Palomar College in San Marcos and I love every minute of it. I want to get a Bachelors degree in Criminal Justice and be in the FBI or some career in that general area.

People seem to treat me differently, because of my disability, but it's actually just because I'm an inspiration to people. I know my life has been difficult, but it has taught me to see that I can do anything I set my mind to. I don't let anything stop me and it has made my life so much of an adventure. I hope people get the taste of who I am and get inspired to help kids with disabilities.

## LODGE DONATION PROCESSING **GUIDELINES**

We want to make sure that donations from any of our members or other people or businesses are properly accounted for. The following are the guidelines for donation processing.

Join the 52, Century and Millennium Clubs: donate \$52 and receive a letter, silver lapel pin and a certificate signed by the Association President and Exalted Ruler of your Lodge. Donate \$100 and receive a letter, gold lapel pin and an upgraded certificate. \$1,000, or reach an accumulation of \$1,000 (excluding BLT donations and label/holiday card program donations) and receive a letter, special Millennium Club sparkling gold lapel pin and a special Millennium club certificate. You may donate as many times as you would like and receive multiple certificates and pins.

Lodges may accumulate individual's donations until they have \$52.00 or \$100.00 and then send in the money. The Fresno CHEMPI office does not accumulate individual donations except for Millennium Club. Lodges and groups do not qualify for the Millennium Club, individuals.

We encourage all Lodges to send in each month all 52 Club and Century Club donations along with any general Lodge donations. Smaller individual donations may be sent in or accumulated at the Lodge for 52 and Century Clubs. A check of a matching dollar amount must accompany the donor list. Smaller individual donations will not be acknowledged, unless they are for memorials or other honorary donations; however they will be applied to the person's account to accumulate for the millennium Club.

So that the CHEMPI office may ensure donations are credited to the proper member, please provide a vertical list of all Century Club donors (preferably in alphabetical order by last name, first name) followed by a similar list of 52 Club donors. If the individual has a common name (i.e. John Smith, Sue Jones, etc.) please list their middle initial as well. Following the 52 Club donors, please list any

smaller individual donations for people not on the Century and 52 Club lists.

Some Lodges use a Century Club or a 52 Club form for each donor which is also acceptable.

We do not use member numbers here so they do not need to be included with the donations.

If an individual is donating more than one Century club or 52 Club at this time, please put the number of clubs in parenthesis after their name.

If you are including a general Lodge donation in this check, please indicate the dollar amount included.

You do not need to cut a separate check for Century Clubs and 52 Clubs, but may do so if that is easier for your accounting purposes



## **Easy Fund Raisers**

A fundraiser is an event or campaign whose primary purpose is to raise money for a cause, charity or non-profit organization. Special events are a method of raising funds. These range from formal dinners to concerts to walkathons, all of which take a lot of work. These events are used to increase visibility and support for an organization as well as for raising funds.

Well, there is an easy way to raise funds, support, enjoy the event along with others, and increase visibility. There are numerous companies out there that are willing to give to organizations like the Elks; all we need to do is ask. I've made a list below.

Each one has different requirements and it may require you to sell candy or donuts and what Elks don't like candy or donuts,? Ok there are a few. But they all have to eat, so Eat for a Cause – Ask a local restaurant for a designated night for your cause in exchange

for encouraging supporters to eat there and you get 10% to 20% of their profits.

Black Bear Diner	earn 10%
Panda Express	earn 20%
Boston Market	earn 15%
California Pizza Kitchen	earn 20%
BJ's Pub	earn 15%
Applebee's	earn 20%

There are other types of food and non-food related ideas to look into such as See's Candy, Krispy Kreme Donuts, IHOP, El Pollo Loco, Wendy's, theaters, Brick R Us, first aid products, Yankee candle and of course you can do the gift wrapping. Here are several ways to raise funds for the Purple Pig for next year's Exalted Rulers March, now it's all up to you.

- 1. Start planning your fundraiser at least 30 days in advance.
- 2. Work with your group to pick a date for the fundraisers. Restaurants will want to do them during the week, so make sure you have some dates covering Monday thru Thursday.
- 3. Find a local restaurant to help you. The restaurant should be local and convenient to get to.
- 4. You have a day and you have a restaurant. Now it is time to promote. Some restaurants will give you flyers and stickers to hand out; some have you do your own. If you need to turn a coupon or a flyer in, make sure you get them out to the public.
- 5. Use your newsletter, email, Facebook, webpage. You get the picture; encourage everyone in the neighborhood to stop by. Get volunteers to help you the day of the fundraiser. Have people greeting your group as they come in the door. Some restaurants will let you work behind the counter.
- 6. Have fun! When everyone hears about the great time people had at the fundraiser, more will show up at the next one.

# California Elks Camper Rally Mission Statement Who are the children the California-Hawaii Major Project, Inc. (The Purple Pig) serves?

They are the children who have been lost to "the system," the children who are not considered eligible to receive services from other agencies or programs for their disabilities. It may be because they have no insurance. It may be because they live too far away. Whatever the reason, the Elks are there to help them with services through the Major Project.

The "California Elks Camper Rally" started in 1969 as the "Southern California Elks Camper Rally." The goals of this Rally are for campers and friends to gather together for a weekend of food, fun, games, contests and camaraderie; with the final objective of raising money for the California - Hawaii Elks Association Major Project, i.e. the Purple Pig.

The interest and participation in the Rally has increased tremendously over the years and we arrived at a point where it was believed that the name "Southern California Elks Camper Rally" no longer reflected this progress. In 1998, a name change to the "California Elks Camper Rally" was made to better reflect our growth and the statewide participation we enjoy. At the present time we have participation not only from the Lodges in the State of California, but also from beyond its borders.

This year the "California Elks Camper Rally" will be held in Hemet, California on October 10, 11, 12, & 13, 2013.
