- 42 lodges for the Promise Grant
- 8 lodges were approved for the Impact Grant

The 2016-17 Gratitude Grant Final Report Forms are due by August 31, 2017. An editable copy of the 2016-17 Gratitude Grant Final Report Form is also available online. Applications must be submitted before the project takes place. Applications close May 31, 2017. Funds must be spent by July 31, 2017.

Now it's time to look ahead. To all the incoming Exalted Rulers, I urge you to start NOW making your choices of the members you'll want on your Membership Management Team. That team should include you the Exalted Ruler, the Secretary of the Lodge, the Lodge Activities Chairman and the chairperson of the Public Relations Committee. In addition you should have an additional committee person for each one hundred members in your lodge. Begin studying the Membership manual and the other information available on the CHEA and elks.org websites. A well planned campaign with measurable goals and a fair division of labor will ensure a successful program with a minimum of stress for everyone. A team approach has proven to be the most effective and consistent way to manage lodge membership. Leaving it up to the Secretary or Exalted Ruler alone is a sure way to scuttle your chances of reaching your goal.

I intend to conduct a workshop at the CHEA Convention in Palm Springs this upcoming May and I hope that many of the incoming District Membership Chairs and Exalted Rulers will attend. I'm here as a resource for you, if you have any questions or issues concerning the program, do not hesitate to reach out to me. I'm listed in the CHEA Directory and am available to you at any time.

Vacaville Lodge 2638, in keeping with the Elks National theme of "Elks Care Elks Share", closed out 2016 with its 20th consecutive year of providing Christmas gifts and food for the less fortunate in the communities served by the Vacaville Lodge. This Christmas, the program known as Bob's Kids, provided 19 families with 97 family members individual merchandise gift cards along with a food gift card for each of the families. Additionally, 30 deserving senior citizens were provided with monthly city bus passes. The Vacaville Elks Bob's Kids program started in 1996 by helping a few local needy families with toys, clothing and food and has progressively grown since that time. Funding comes from Lodge members, their families, local Elks fund raisers and generous donations from Fentons Creamery and El Ranch Vasquez. In recent years, including 2016, Vacaville has applied for and received a Beacon grant for this program.

Just prior to the 2016 Holiday season, the Vacaville Elks applied for and received an ENF Promise Grant to support the Lodge's project of donating well over \$2,000 in school supplies to elementary schools in the Dixon and Fairfield School Districts.

Fremont Lodge 2121 members in November worked in conjunction with Home Depot employees partnered to create, cleanup and improve common area gardens at the Livermore VA Hospital.

Twice a year, Home Depot's Team Depot takes on a community service project for which they provide all materials and tools needed. In looking for a non-profit to partner with on the Livermore VA Garden of Heroes project, the Fremont Elks Lodge was chosen because the lodge is committed to improving lives of veterans.

The project included adding mulch to pathways and around trees, the placing of garden art pieces near the entrance, the planting of flowers and fruit trees. Several benches were assembled, planter boxes built and an American flag was woven into the fencing.

On Christmas Eve, the Fremont Elks Lodge, in conjunction with Castro Valley VFW Post 9601, Castro Valley VFW 9601 Auxiliary, Castro Valley American Legion Post and Every Little Life Matters delivered gifts to 80 patients at the Livermore Veterans Hospital.

In other news, a \$2,000 Freedom Grant was awarded to the Lodge and is being used to deliver welcome baskets to veterans transitioning from homelessness into their own homes. The first seven baskets were delivered in early January. The laundry baskets contain supplies such as mops, sponges, brooms, kitchen, bathroom and laundry soaps and various other basic cleaning supplies that will aid in setting up and maintaining their homes.



Oceanside "Hugs from Home" Elks 1561 a charity that is sponsored by the Oceanside Lodge. Director Sandee Murphy, and her volunteers send out care packages from products which are donated by the public, many of which are Elks, and organizations who support our activities and postage to deliver packages.

One of the many groups that we send packages to have sent us "Thank you" pictures so that we may see the gratitude that our military feels! Sandee Murphy wanted to thank the Elk members, her volunteers, the Western Eagle Foundation, the Civitans, VFW 7041, and all the ladies who make blankets, caps, wheel chair and walker bags. It is because of all of you that it is possible!

A thank you letter was received from 1st Sgt. Elson L. Aviles from Alpha Battery, Landing Team 1/4, USS Makin Island.

I wanted to take some time and thank you guys, the Hugs from Home Elks 1561. The Marines really appreciate the care package you sent us. It definitely brought a smile to them. A few of the Marines wrote letters. As soon as we get time we will be sending those off.

Honolulu Lodge 616 attended the rededication ceremony of the United States Marine Corp Memorial at the USS Arizona Memorial Center, World War II Valor in the Pacific, National Park Service, located at the US Naval Base Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

The memorial honors the 73 US Marines who were killed in action on-board the USS Arizona in defense of Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941. They still remain entombed in the ship along with other military personnel. Only 15 marines survived that day of battle.

Steel from the bridge of the USS Arizona was actually used as the rebar on the 7,000 pound concrete memorial.

The renovation's Senior Executive Project Manager, and Elk 616 member John Scheleski coordinated and collaborated with the various National Park Service personnel, the Marine Corp League Aloha Detachment 363, various craftsmen to completely restore and display the memorial with honor and distinction.

I was introduced to the Chili's Southern California Regional Director on the evening of the event and was proud to have been able to explain what the Elks are about and what this event was supporting. When he heard about what we do to help children he was very proud that Chili's was a part of it. There are some great things in the works being discussed with Chili's as we move forward.

Walnut Creek Lodge 1811 contacted the Martinez CA VA Hospital and became involved in the Homeless Veterans Program. Since September the Lodge has helped 19 homeless veterans. The first 5 got our welcome home packages that included dishes, cups, and flatware, for 4, bath towels, kitchen towels, kitchen utensils, as well as household cleaning supplies.

Donations of furniture followed, not new but in good condition. This has enabled our Lodge to help those veterans and others we expect to enter the VA Hospital program. The week before Christmas we got a female veteran with an eight year old child who was homeless and getting an apartment. Six days before Christmas we were able to give her brand new dishware, flatware, glasses, pots & pans, towels and bedding to go along with donations of a sofa, recliner, coffee maker, floor lamp and Christmas presents for the veteran and her child.



On Sunday, December 11, the Walnut Creek Elks celebrated their 31st Annual Hoop Shoot contest and awarded prizes to their top contenders in the Elks Hoop Shoot competition. In all, 185 children participated in the competition.

The event took place on October 30st in the lodges' dining room because of rainy weather. The weather actually turned out to be in our favor as the community participation was overwhelming. Smokey and Sparky visited and were a huge hit. All had a great time; and we delivered our message in a fun manner.

Throughout the day she deals with a large amount of emails, troubleshoots computer issues within the office, deals with phone calls from our over 500 CHEA volunteers and 30 CHEMPI employees, answers questions the office staff may have and manages the daily inner workings of the CHEA/CHEMPI Administrative Office in Fresno.

Charisce says she loves the creative part of her job whether it is creating a PowerPoint presentation for convention, developing software script, writing articles/letters, website design or editing articles for The California-Hawaii Elk magazine. Another aspect she says she loves is "detail". She is the official "proofreader" in the office and has fondly been referred to as "eagle eye Charisce".

One of her biggest challenges is the variety and volume of information and work processed through the CHEA/CHEMPI office, coordinating, delegating and prioritizing issues with the five administrative staff so that the administrative office runs smoothly and efficiently every day. Taking care of the CHEA volunteers and CHEMPI employees are top priority for her and her staff. Working with the Major Project therapists and vision screeners is equally rewarding; from new employee orientation to administering the employee health plan, assisting with administrative support for the yearly Professional Institute and clients served by the Major Project.

Charisce says her favorite thing about the job is never knowing what the next day holds. She thrives on being busy and facing challenges head-on to find the proper solution. Whether it's searching for a new and upgraded laser color printer, reconciling end of year pension spreadsheets, preparing for convention or writing a proposal, she looks forward to every day as a new opportunity to accomplish something good. For example, when our United States vendor for the purple piggy banks handed out to new members by our Lodges was lost, she learned how to deal directly with our manufacturer in China to order the piggy banks. She oversees the ordering, production and travel from China through the United States customs to arrive accurately and safely in Fresno, a three to four month process!

A lot of things have changed in 35 years. When Charisce started in 1981, she took shorthand for the Executive Director and used electric typewriters and giant computers. Technology has enabled the administrative staff to grow with the increase in donations generated for the Major Project by the many new fund raising ideas over the years. Much of the work that was sent to outside printing companies is now produced in-house such as the Directory of Officers and Committeemen, color brochures and annual convention proceedings.



In her 35 years with CHEA/CHEMPI, she has worked for three Executive Directors, one Assistant Executive Director, eight managers and seen over 100 employees come and go. Being flexible has given her the opportunity to learn about the history of CHEA and CHEMPI and gain knowledge and experience in each of the administrative positions in the CHEA office being able to fill in when and where needed to keep the office humming along.

She also says working for an organization that helps disabled children is very gratifying and at the end of the day all CHEA/ CHEMPI employees can feel gratitude in knowing they are part of a group of people dedicated to helping those less fortunate. Charisce loves her job and says it has been a pleasure and honor to work for the Elks of California and Hawaii!

Drug Awareness Program

I have often been asked what makes a person become a drug addict. I thought I would make this the thesis of this month's article. I know of no one who consciously made the decision to become a drug addict. Environmental influences are usually the underlying reason a person tries a dangerous substance. The opportunity to be a

substance abuser is environmental. It can be the influence or social pressure of fellow classmates, parents, or contact with a pusher or user. The children whose parents are substance abusers are more likely to become abusers themselves than the children of the non-abusing parents. The perception is that it is OK because my parents do it or It's OK because everyone else does it. I just want to fit in with my friends. Icons such as Michael Jackson, Elvis Presley, Whitney Houston, and others make it seem glamorous in spite of the fact that it killed them. These are psychological reasons to try an addictive substance. Whatever the reason, it soon becomes a physiological addiction.

What makes something addictive, as Ray Lazano put it, is the "pleasure button". Ray Lazano is an outstanding inspirational public speaker often sponsored by the Elks. Ray talks about "the pleasure button" when referring to the effects of controlled substances. This pleasure button is in fact the chemical effects the drug has on the body that make us "feel better". Controlled substances affect the neurotransmissions in several ways. The drug may stimulate the body to produce endorphins like dopamine. We shoot heroin to feel the "high". We snort cocaine to feel the euphoria. It is the "pleasure" that we receive when using a drug that starts us down the road to being addicted. The "feel better" is rather instantaneous. The drug hits the dopamine button, flooding our body with pleasure.

The "pleasure button" can be pushed by things other than drugs. Exercise is one example. Runners often seem to be addicted to running because they feel better after aerobic exercise. Their exercise has pushed the pleasure button by causing the body to release dopamine and other endorphins into the system. The problem with controlled substances is that they can supplant or replace the body's natural chemistry to the point that the body reduces or stops producing its own. Opiates are a good example of substances that replaces natural chemistry to the point that the body becomes addicted to the outside source. In other words, the body no longer produces enough natural chemistry, and as a consequence, relies on an outside source.

A person is addicted when their body requires the drug to feel "normal", and without drugs the body goes through "withdrawal". You can't function normally without the influence of the drug. Alcohol is a good example of a substance that takes a considerable amount of substance over time to cause addiction. However, once addicted, an alcoholic can't function normally without being under the influence. One of the most addicting substances is nicotine. Cigarettes and other tobacco products contain nicotine. Smoking substitutes such as electronic cigarettes also contain nicotine, and are addicting. A smoker doesn't feel good without a certain level of nicotine in their body. Withdrawal from nicotine is tough, just ask any smoker who has quit the habit. Cocaine and heroin users are more quickly addicted. There is no specific event or moment in time where someone becomes addicted. It could be the first time someone tries a drug or the hundredth time they try the drug. Everyone is different in that respect; however, everyone who uses an addictive substance will over time become addicted. No one is superman or superwoman.

In other news, Santa was present at the Lodge Children's Christmas Party to present gifts to all children in attendance.




