Elks National Foundation

2017-2018 was a great year for our fraternal organization especially in the arena of Elks National Foundation (ENF) giving. As we are already several months into the new Elk year, I wanted to thank Bob Ostini, PDDGER, the outgoing CHEA National Foundation Chairman, for his past two years as chairman. He did an

awesome job and set some records. He deserves our gratitude for a job well done!

So how is the Elks National Foundation Helping California-Hawaii? Each year the Elks National Foundation gives back more money to each state than it received from that state in donations. This money helps fund our state associations' major project and other charitable projects serving children with disabilities, the Hoop Shoot, Soccer Shoot, Drug Awareness, Scholarship and Veterans.

During the 2017-18 Lodge year, the Elks of California-Hawaii donated \$1,018,979.87 to the Elks National Foundation. This year, the Foundation will give back the following:

State Charities: \$742,650Special Projects: \$558,830Bonus Grant: \$150,192

• Most Valuable Student: \$304,000

• Legacy Award: \$100,000

• National Veterans Service Commission: \$42,300

These funds will help support our state's Drug Awareness Program, Hoop Shoot, Soccer Shoot and other educational programs. In addition, the hospitalized veterans will receive aid and comfort from these funds. The grand total received from ENF for 2017-2018 was \$1,898,700.00. That's a ratio of 1.863 for every dollar the Foundation received from California-Hawaii Elks last year. And this figure does not include the money Lodges will get back through the Community Investments Program.

The Elks National Foundation is the 'great heart of Elkdom' and it is only through your generous donations that the Foundation continues to thrive. We are so grateful to the members for their support year round. Every year we ask our members to continue in the giving spirit. An easy way to continue this effort is to sign up and participate in the ENF Fidelity Club. This is the recurring donation program in which the donation amount that you decide comes automatically from your debit card each month. The Fidelity Club asks for a minimum commitment of \$5.00 a month. Ask your Lodge ENF Chairman for an enrollment form.

Remember that ENF not only stands for the Elks National Foundation; it stands for what we as ELKS do all year; nurturing our charitable works be it the Hoop Shoot Program or local Lodge Purple Pig events. We, as Elks, are in the communities 'Honoring the Past—Embracing the Future'.

In other news, the Lodge distributed medication disposal kits at a local fair.






