The Grand Lodge Convention was excellent this year with so many seminars available for learning and sharing the latest information. gest tool we can utilize in this endeavor is Public Relations. Having events that involve and benefit our communities is a driving force in increasing membership.



Scholarship

With the arrival of September many students are preparing for their Senior year of High School. Many of these Seniors are also making plans on where they plan on continuing their education after High School, and how they are going to pay for it.

I'd like to briefly mention the Most Valuable Student Scholarship Contest offered by the Elks National Foundation, but go over in more detail the Vocational Grant Program offered by our California-Hawaii Elks Association.

MOST VALUABLE STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP

The Elks National Foundation will offer 500 Scholarships ranging from \$4,000 - \$50,000. These awards are given over a 4 year period. The contest will once again be a 100% secure, paperless, online submission and processing application. Applications were available beginning August 15, 2018, and the submittal deadline will be November 15, 2018. Lodge judging will be completed by December 20, 2018, District judging completed by January 14, 2019, and State Judging will be held February 15-16, 2019.

CALIFORNIA-HAWAII ELKS VOCATIONAL GRANTS

The Vocational Grant program is open to anyone residing in California or Hawaii who is a citizen of the United States of America and planning to pursue an eligible vocational/technical course resulting in a certificate or two-year degree and leading to employment opportunities.

The program is open to male and female applicants who will be judged on an equal basis. While graduating high school seniors may apply, it is not limited to high school students-in fact, it is open to all prospective students who require training or retraining to compete in the workplace.

The Vocational Grant is for one academic year, with an option to renew for one additional academic year. This grant may be used only for usual and required costs of student's course of study; that is, for tuition and fees, room and board (if living on campus) and books & supplies. Payment will be made to the school. Awards will be between \$500 and 2,000 for an academic year depending on length of course.

The definition of an eligible program shall be comparable to that contained in the federal vocational legislation. That is defined as a two-year or less vocational/technical program culminating in a terminal Associate degree, diploma or certificate, but less than a baccalaureate program (Bachelor's degree). Students planning to transfer to a four year school to pursue a Bachelor's degree are not eligible to apply.

Examples of courses approved recently are:

- 6 month Police Academy
- 13 month Cosmetology
- 3 month Electrical Lineman
- 13 month Veterinary Technology
- 2 year Fire Science

A student must plan to attend school on a full-time basis for a minimum of sixty days. An academic year is determined to be a minimum of nine (9) months (approximately 39 weeks) of continuous full-time study. Payments may not be used to cover retroactive charges and may only be applied to expenses in the academic year.

Applications must be filed with the Scholarship Chairman, Exalted Ruler, or Secretary of the Elks Lodge having jurisdiction in the area of the student's legal residence. An application may only be filed with one Lodge.

Video Contest. The Poster Contest is for students in third grade; fourth grade and fifth grade. The Essay Contest is for students in the 6th grade; 7th grade and 8th grade. The Video Contest is for the pre-high school; high school and post graduate high school. The forms for all three contests are on the CHEA website under Youth Activities. Your district chairman will set the date when the entries, for each of the contests are due to him/her. The district chairman will judge the entries and send the winning entries to the CHEA Drug Awareness Chairman.

The Elks Enrique Camarena Award has been established by the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks to recognize and honor law enforcement officers who have made a significant contribution in the field of drug prevention and who personify Agent Camarena's belief that one person can make a difference. Special Agent Enrique Camarena was a slain DEA Agent, murdered by the Mexican Drug Cartel, while investigating drug trafficking into the United States. He was brutally tortured and killed in 1985. His death precipitated the start of the Red Ribbon Campaign that we celebrate each year during October in his honor. The Red Ribbon Campaign was started by the Camarena family and friends as a tribute to Agent Camarena. However, it also serves as a reminder to all of us about the dangers of substance abuse.

Each year, the BPO Elks present the Enrique S. Camarena Award to a member of law enforcement who best exemplifies the qualities and principles for which Agent Camarena gave his life. Nominees should be involved in their communities in efforts to make them drug-free. Nominees should have the support of their agency and respect of their community.

Additional information on the Enrique Camarena Award can be found on the CHEA website in addition to the nomination form. Complete the form and on a separate sheet(s) of paper write a one or two-page article on the Nominee's accomplishments in Drug Education and Prevention in their community. Nominations should be submitted to the CHEA Drug Awareness Chairman by October 15, 2018. Each of the Elks Lodge awards and District awards should be made before October 15th to ensure they can be included in the State competition. National selection will take place in December and the award will be presented during the next calendar year.

Government Relations

As an Exalted Ruler, weather this is your first time or not, I am sure that when you find yourself guiding and assisting the Lodge Chairman with his or her committee it will be very rewarding for everyone involved.

A good way to show how rewarding it can be is by keeping statistics of all the charitable work

the committee has accomplished, throughout the year. We have made it simple to do this by furnishing every Lodge with a Charity Records Workbook, along with a Government Relations manual that has appendices 7 and 8 to help in keeping track of charitable work. Please make copies of these forms and distribute to each committee chairman. By doing this you will make your Lodge Secretary's work much easier.

It is very important for each Lodge to sit down with every officer, committee chairman, and any member interested and go through the Government Relations manual page by page. You will probably hear things like "I didn't know we could count that," or "Why haven't we been reporting that?". Going through the guide will help your Lodge better serve those who are less fortunate and make positive changes in your community.

After you have done this, compile your statistics quarterly and post them on your Lodge bulletin board, monthly newsletter, and E-mail blast. If you have a signage board out front, put it there. Another good place to share this is with your local officials. Let them know what the Elks are doing. Invite them to one of your charitable events or a Lodge function and let them see firsthand that "Elks Care Elks Share".

As you know we are a very quiet organization. One reason is because we do not have just one major project that we contribute to nationally. For the Fraternal year 2018-2019 Elks National Foundation Board of Trustees has budgeted \$33.8 million to be distributed: \$12.4 million to Lodges and Community Grants. \$9.6 million to State Major Projects, \$4.6 million in Scholarships, \$1 million to Hoop Shoot, \$709,680 to Drug Awareness, and \$325,900 in miscellaneous grants. This is certainly a good start to our charitable giving.

Let's remember that this is or 150th Anniversary. It is time for us to speak up and show our government just how powerful and benevolent the Elks are. The main way we can do this is by keep-ing detailed records of all the awesome things that we are doing. Let's make a change, not only for 100% reporting but 100% of what we are doing.

Our new Area 7 Chairman wants CHEA to have 100% reporting this year. We will be visiting the Lodges that did not report last year. We will also be looking at the Lodges that were late in their reporting last year. So, no excuses this year.





Santa Maria Lodge 1538 and Elks Recreation held their Golden Circle of Champions fundraiser benefitting local children battling cancer. The event is part of the Elks Rodeo which celebrated its 75th year this June. The Elks Rodeo works with the local hospital to identify local families with a child diagnosed with pediatric cancer. Again this year, the Golden Circle of Champions raised enough money to give 25 families more than a thousand dollars each to ease the burden of travel and other expenses. Santa Maria Elks hosts the families at the Thursday night rodeo performance, where a local restaurant, the Hitching Post, provides dinner, Resistol provides Cowboy Hats and Central Coast Party Factory offers free access to Camp Buckaroo children's zone at the rodeo grounds. The Golden Circle of Champions was inspired by Lexi Brown, a 12-year old Santa Maria Valley girl who died in 2016 after a long, well-publicized battle against cancer, and this program continues to grow every year. This December at the National Rodeo finals in Las Vegas the PRCA (Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association) will include for the first time the Golden Circle of Champions to benefit children battling cancer which originated at the Santa Maria Elks Rodeo.

The first performance of the 2018 Santa Maria Elks Rodeo at the Elks Unocal Arena each year is the Clarence Minetti Mini Rodeo. This year 6,000 plus children were invited to enjoy a morning of rodeo action. One hundred school busses sponsored by local businesses and individuals arrive with 6,000 plus 3rd graders and younger children. Before attending the rodeo, the children receive lessons on Western heritage and flag etiquette. As they enter the rodeo grounds they are greeted by active military personnel from Vandenberg AFB and Elk members who hand out an American Flags to each child. The local cowboys that compete in the Mini Rodeo are 17 and younger potential rodeo stars. One of the most popular events is the Mutton Busting, where about a dozen children ages 5 to 7 attempt to ride an untrained sheep for as long as possible.

The Santa Maria Rodeo Parade scores very big for area Youth. In the seventy five year history of the Rodeo, the Rodeo Queen candidates have raised in excess of 12.5 million dollars for youth recreation in the Santa Maria Valley and surrounding areas. The rodeo is ranked the best mid-sized rodeo in the country. This year the rodeo was broadcast live to 23 countries on the Wrangler Network and will be featured on a National Geographic Channel special on American Rodeos.






