

THE VISION

The needs for a specialized camping facility for medically challenged youth in the Mountainwest was recognized in the mid-eighties. Following a four year search for suitable property, the Utah Elks Association established Camp Wapiti in 1990 in concert with a collation of associations supporting young clients with diabetes, lung disease, cancer, hemophilia, abused children, hearing challenges, and children with congenital heart disease.

Together they created a camping environment where medically challenged children can enjoy a true camping experience with a variety of recreational activities while receiving vital educational information to live longer, healthier and happier lives for themselves and their families. Young people come to Camp Wapiti not only from the State of Utah but from five surrounding states. The Camp serves the needs of the health care agencies involved with a long term goal to deny no child the opportunity to attend because of space or financial constraints.


Without Camp Wapiti and each agency providing the medical equipment, care and medication for their clients, these children would never have the opportunity to enjoy a traditional camping experience. Each agency provides its own volunteer camp and medical staff and creates an appropriate agenda of activities for each of their groups.

THEKID

The Utah Elks Camp Wapiti has made a very positive and substantial difference in the lives of thousands of young people and their families. The Utah Elks Association facility and each health agency's camping agenda has allowed each child to gain confidence and a sense of security in managing their own disease.

Children learn they are not the only one who is medically challenged and it is possible to participate in a variety of fun activities, previously thought impossible. Tight-knit friendships are established at the Camp, helping provide a network of support that lives well past the camping experience.

Each child gains substantial self-confidence, learns valuable new information about the management and control of their respective disease, and builds enhanced self-awareness and esteem. All of this occurs at an age when the children need to begin assuming more of a responsibility for the administration for their own treatment program. Some of the camps even welcome siblings of the campers to participate and integrate in an educational and fun-filled environment filled with positive activities.
