

Elks National Foundation

The month of March brings a rallying finale to end this Elks year and for others, plans are being made for the start of another Elks year; one that involves the Elks National Foundation programs and events.

At this time, all Lodges should be reviewing their ENF participation reports and asking have I done

enough? Make one last push to increase your donations.

Donations must be received in the ENF office by March 31, 2020 to count toward the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Send by March 15th to ensure this deadline is met. Anything received by mail after March 31 will be considered a 2020-2021 donation. Online donations for the 2019-2020 fiscal year may be made until 11:59 p.m. Central Time on March 31, 2020.

Grand Lodge has some updates planned for how we recognize individual donors and Lodges for all their support. Look for the release of detailed information on this towards the middle of the year. As we look toward the future, it's also valuable to reflect on where we've come from. The coolest thing about our membership is that even though our membership has declined through the years, our donations to ENF have continued to be made at record levels and thus allowing ENF through their grant programs to enhance the charitable works that our members continue to provide to their communities. Elkdom's membership may be smaller than 40 years ago, but our programs are larger than ever and that is very impressive.

Currently as an Association we are at \$9.12 per-capita, per-member with total donations of \$791,787.18. Last year for ending results of the 2018 – 2019 Elks year, per-capita was \$10.85 and total donations of \$929,599.72. I know I can count on all of you to assist with meeting our goal for this Elk year.

During the first week of January, 22 Elks scholars traveled to San Diego, the South Coast District, for a week of learning, serving, and connecting in the name of the Elks. For many, this trip was a chance to give back, travel to Southern California, and escape the cold winter weather of their hometowns. But none of them expected to leave six days later with a completely new perspective on issues like homelessness, poverty and food insecurity, along with a new group of friends from across the country. All of the scholars agreed that the most impactful part of the trip was the connections they made: with each other, the Elks, and most importantly, the people they serve.

The scholars served with various organizations in the San Diego/ Chula Vista area both directly and indirectly. While sorting clothing donations at the Veterans Village of San Diego and bagging produce at the San Diego Food Bank—although not directly connecting with those seeking services—the scholars learned important lessons about the organizations' impact and their dependence on volunteers. Tasks like these also helped them bond with each other, as they spent hours sharing their stories and learning about one another. Thank you Chula Vista Elks Lodge 2011 for your support and sponsorship. This is another perspective of the Elks National Foundation at work for our communities through scholar involvement.

In December, Grand Lodge ENF announced they would match up to \$100,000 in donations to the Elks Pearl Harbor Campaign received by December 31. With the Grand Lodge match, the Elks have now raised nearly \$280,000 for the campaign. Thank you all that contributed to this worthwhile cause.

National President Bob Duitsman presented the initial installment of campaign funds in early January while in Hawaii for a state visit. You can donate through the end of May of this year. The goal is to raise \$783,000 to help preserve history, perpetuate peace and reconciliation and ensure that the memories of our veterans, past and living, are never forgotten.

In closing, I ask you to consider contributing through the Fidelity Club; the easiest way to support the ENF year round. The Elks National Foundation Fidelity Club, a monthly giving program, recognizes giving via automatic, regularly scheduled payments. Eligible donors have a monthly minimum or quarterly minimum payment deducted by credit or debit cards. Or, they can donate regularly through their employer via payroll deductions or Combined Federal Campaign.

Thank you for all you do for the Elks National Foundation and our communities at large. Elk's rock!

She attends special needs classes at her high school, and enjoys participating on the Sparkle cheerleading team for special needs teenagers. She also loves horseback riding, which is taken at a center for therapeutic riding.



Fremont Lodge 2121 hosted the USAA and VFW event for the NFL's Salute to Veterans. It was our way of honoring not only the veterans for their service, but also their families for their sacrifices. Eric Wright and Jesse Sapolu, both alumni of the San Francisco 49ers, were on hand along with members of the San Francisco Goldrush, the cheerleaders for the 49ers, to pose for pictures and sign autographs. Each player holds four Super Bowl rings each and spoke to the crowd about their playing days and answering many questions by the audience. The veterans were provided an opportunity to win tickets to a pre-game tailgate party and to be guests at the 49ers vs Seahawks game held on Veterans Day.





Tina Murphy Celebrating 30 Years as a

Pediatric Vision Screener with the Major Project

It is estimated that 1 in every 20 children between the ages of three and five has a significant eye disorder. Healthy eyes and vision are important to a child's early development and education and 80% of all visual impairment can be prevented or cured with early detection. Pediatric vision screening has been part of the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project since 1965. Screenings are held in preschools, daycare centers, Elks Lodges and health fairs. This much needed vision screening effort identifies vision problems very early on allowing the parents the opportunity to take their children to an eye specialist for further evaluation and possible treatment. The Elks' professional staff of pediatric vision screeners will also help guide families in securing appropriate help, follow-up and financial assistance when needed.

Gina Murphy first opened the Modesto and surrounding areas for the Elk's pediatric vision screening program when she was hired in 1989. One of the first committees Gina served on for the pediatric vision screening division was in the early 1990s. The responsibility of this committee was to create much needed forms to record data and keep track of referrals to eye specialists. In 1991 Gina served on a convention committee organizing a breakfast with Elks dignitaries and staff during the annual CHEA convention. In the mid-1990s Gina was appointed as the continuing education representative and would hold this position for the next four years. It was the responsibility of this committee to plan and implement continuing education for professional staff. This committee also met once a year with Elks members who were part of the scholarship program to review and designate scholarship recipients. Gina was promoted as the first Team Leader for PVS in 2010. As a team leader her responsibilities include training and certifying all new pediatric vision screeners as well as serving as an ongoing mentor and clinical supervisor. Finally, not only has Gina been a member of NAVP-National Association of Vision Professionals for many years she has served on the Board of this Association for the past two years.

Soon after Gina opened the Modesto territory for the Major Project's pediatric vision screening program, both schools and parents were expressing their gratitude for this service. Gina began to identify children whose teachers and parents never suspected could have an issue with their vision. Gina once screened a 3-year-old boy whose teacher remarked was very shy and did not play with the other children. Following a screening by Gina this little boy was referred to an eye specialist for further testing. Gina remarked that when she returned to the school the following year she was greeted by his mother who expressed her gratitude for the Elks vision screening. This mother told Gina that now her son had glasses and could see everything so clearly. With perfect vision he was now more involved with the other children at preschool. Even the teacher was amazed at what a difference glasses and seeing the world clearly can make in a child's life.

One parent wrote a thank you letter to The Major Project including their story. "Thank you from the bottom of my family's heart for the vision screening you provide to pre-school students. My son Matthew was diagnosed with Amblyopia because of Gina's screening and referral. We had no idea our son was using only one eye to see! We promptly visited an ophthalmologist as suggested. Luckily, we were able to get glasses for Matthew before he began to lose use of the muscles of his eye and the vision in that eye. We can't thank you enough."

Gina describes herself as having a passion for her work and a gratitude and joy for making a difference in the lives of so many children. She and the other pediatric vision screeners with The Major Project strive to maintain the highest standards in vision screening by attending continuing education courses and using the best testing materials for young children.

Thank you, Gina, for your 30 years of skilled and caring service. Gina is a very valued member of the Major Project. Thank you, Elks, for supporting the Pediatric Vision Screening Program so Gina and all our other pediatric vision screeners can continue their very important work of preventing visual impairments through early detection.

Video "Teens React to Conversations with Survivors of Addiction": The Elks Drug Awareness Program (DAP), the nation's largest all-volunteer drug education group, has partnered with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) to launch a national anti-drug educational video "Teens React To Conversations with Survivors of

Addiction" to spotlight the effects of drugs on teenagers. The video premiered in late November on Fine Brothers Entertainment (FBE), a multi-platform digital studio that serves over 34 million subscribers, with additional content running on its Twitter and Facebook pages using hashtag #ElksDAP and #DEA. As of midDecember, the video had over 500,000 views. Viewers can watch the full video using the following link: YouTube: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=6WNjlc_P604.

The video features teens and their parents watching interviews from a diverse group of adults who describe their journey into addiction and road to recovery. After viewing the footage, the teens and their parents meet the interview subjects in person and further explore their experience. Ahead of the nationwide campaign, teens from all over the country participated in the Elks Anti-Drug Video Contest. The 2019 winning entry, "Sunshine" by El Modena High School Senior Sandy Beach, elicited very strong and emotional reactions and was then watched by the teens, parents and individuals in recovery as seen in the video. Following this, the group then engaged in a candid and heartfelt discussion that is a must watch for parents and their children. It is at times lighthearted and other times heart wrenching as the parents, teens and people in recovery connect on a truly human level.

The video, while being very engaging, also provides information for teens and parents on how to handle peer pressure, conversations with your kids, signs that someone you care about might have a problem and many other important subjects critical to keeping kids safe and drug free. The video also encourages parents, kids and teens to visit www.elkskidzone.com, the Elks DAP Kids site, www.getsmartaboutdrugs.com and www.justthinktwice.com, the DEA's website for teens and parents, educators and caregivers, all of which provide access to an array of education and treatment resources.

The project was once again created by Sunny Day Entertainment, who previously partnered with the DEA and Elks DAP on several anti-drug videos with SMOSH in 2017 and 2018. The Elks have also created several comic books, including ones with the New York Fire Department and Marvel which are available on www. Elkskidzone.com.

Poster, Essay and Video Contests: The CHEA DAP Committee is now in the process of judging the Poster, Essay and Video contests. The results will be announced in the next issue of the CHEA Magazine. Thank you to the districts who participated in the contests.

Next Drug Take Back Day: The next Drug Take Back Day is Saturday, April 25, 2020. National Take Back Day is a safe, convenient and responsible way to dispose of unused or expired prescription drugs. Check DEA's official Take Back Day website for more information and to find year-round collection sites near you.

President's Volunteer Service Awards: The Youth Volunteer Service Award is available year-round, however the Adult Lifetime President's Volunteer Service Awards are not available at the present time. It was a pleasure to report, at the Woodland-Sacramento 2019 Mid-Term Conference, an increase in the number of Lodges and the information submitted for the second quarter Lodge Activities report. Our first quarter CHEA Lodge Activities report was submitted with 17 of the 19 districts reporting, 104 of the 168 Lodges report-

ed, (63%). All 19 District Chairmen submitted a second quarter report, and many districts showed improvement in data collection and Lodge participation. This period, 131 Lodges reported, bringing up our average to 77%.

The cumulative data that is contributed by the Lodges on these Activities Reports is the foundation of what we are doing as Elks, and is vital for our organization to retain its non-profit status. At the Lodge level, the Lodge Activities chairperson needs to review the entries, making sure as much information as possible is being collected, getting recorded, and submitted to the district in a timely manner. The members of the Lodges have already done the hard work. They have done their part in support of our programs in your community. By documenting and reporting the Lodge Activities, we show respect for the miles driven and hours of preparation and facilitation by your members and volunteers. Their efforts are thereby acknowledged, and they can take pride in their contributions.

The Lodge Activities Manual is a reference by which you can make sure your Lodge is promoting the programs and values of the Elks, and maintaining the vitality and interest of your Lodge membership. The Lodge Activities chairperson will find this a good source of information to share with other Lodge committee chairs, regarding areas of participation and new members, planning and assessing your activities, and, reviewing and reporting them. The activities described in the manual include the routine mandated meetings and rituals, prescribed attendance and program events, and non-prescribed functions, including those specific to your Lodge... many things your Lodge is already doing.

On a similar note, a copy of the application form for the "ALL AMERICAN LODGE" Contest was sent to the Exalted Rulers and the District Deputy Grand Exalted Rulers in July. Besides being a contest for which every Lodge is eligible, every Lodge can be considered competitive in one of the six different divisions by membership. It is actually a useful tool that I recommend for Elk year planning. The activities reflected on the form are a great guideline for planning your Elk year and getting ideas for additional activities. Along with the Lodge Activities manual, it can help keep you on track for a strong Lodge Activities Program. Every Lodge should be able to send in an application in their division and feel pride in their accomplishments, which are considered on a point basis. Plan to submit your Lodge's application to your District Deputy by the March 15th deadline... by doing so, everyone wins.

Thinking about it, pretty much every time you go to the Lodge, it's for a Lodge activity...!


