

capita goal of \$4.80. We realize that this last year was difficult for all members and local Lodges, we appreciate all that your Lodges were able to give. THANK YOU!!!!

#### A Thank You from ENE:

"As we enter the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic, we understand that Lodges across the country continue to face challenges. Although fundraising and promotion may not seem relevant at this time, we know that the communities we serve will continue to rely on ENF programs throughout this crisis and into the future. That makes our ENF Fundraising Chairs and their efforts more critical than ever as we strive to deliver our mission to those who need it most."

I do not have the final year end reporting yet, but as soon as those numbers are available I will be sending them out to the District ENF chairs. If you are a new or returning Lodge or District ENF chairman, please remember to go to the ENF site at elks.org/enf/ENFChairmanRegistration.cfm and register as a chairman.

There will be a change to the Donor Recognition program for 2021. It is the discontinuation of the Participating Member (\$100), Sustaining Member (\$250) and Distinguished Member (\$500) levels. ENF wants to emphasize more on the annual giving levels, and encourage monthly giving through the Fidelity Club. Our state currently has 499 donors enrolled in the Fidelity Club. Members can donate directly to the Foundation by mailing a check to the ENF office if their Lodge is closed, or they can use the online donation form at the ENF website enf.elks.org/ MyLodge, both methods ensure that the donors and their Lodges will get credit.

We have had great success with the Community Investments Program and the Grants awarded to our Lodges this past year. Those Grants are made possible by our ENF donations. Speaking of Grants, April 1st started our new Grant year, and the Gratitude and Beacon Grants are available. On June 1st the Freedom and Spotlight Grants become available. # A Little History of the B.P.O.E. **The Origin of the Term Cervus Alces**

In the early days of the Elks the term Cervus Alces appeared everywhere in Elkdom

In the 1600's, a French naturalist made an extensive study of North America's flora and fauna, and scientifically categorized his various discoveries with appropriate biological names. These categories were as in genus, species, subcategory, etc. There was a Latin name Cervus Alces that he assigned which actually represents the whole deer family branch, this included elk, deer, moose, caribou etc.

Two centuries later in 1867, a 4-man committee from the original group of the fifteen BPOE founding fathers "the Jolly Corks" was researching which animal to have represent their fledgling Order. The decision was based on the zeal of one committeeman who had seen at the P.T. Barnum's Broadway Museum of Oddities, a stuffed Irish Great Elk. This animal was extinct and was approximately twice the size of the North American Elk.

These men were hooked, and consulted the natural histories of Buffon and Goldsmith. They found the elk to be described as a truly noble creature. The choice was then made to name the organization, the "Elks".

However, through error, the name "Cervus Alces" was mistakenly thought to be the specific name of our beloved animal, and given their love of secrecy, adopted it as a password of sorts for the next half century, thinking it to mean "Stag Elk". This error compounded itself in their arrangements, for the first officer's jewels. The term "Cervus Alces" was used in discussion with the manufacturer. The original jewels now on display in our Chicago Memorial Building clearly depict a moose.

Eventually, embarrassment over the mistaken usage of the term lead to its modern demise.

# **BLT Legacy Giving**

Greetings Members:

First, Congratulations to all of the new Lodge Officers who take their positions on April 1st, have a great year! This month, we will talk a bit about leaving the Major Project a gift in your estate plan. A gift to the California-Hawaii

Major Project, Inc. in your Trust or Will is a charitable bequest. Adding this charitable bequest will mean that our Major Project will receive part or all of your estate on your death. The provision can be in percentage form, a certain dollar amount, or all. The gift can be changed by you any time prior to your death assuming of course that in the case of a trust, it is revocable and amendable during your lifetime. If you are wanting to do this, please contact your estate planning professional. Also, remember that assets that you hold in joint tenancy with another, or that have a beneficiary designation on them are not subject to your estate planning documents so you should consider that, as well.

Adding the Major Project to your Trust or Will means that you fully control the gift during your lifetime as it passes only upon your death. Bequests are easy to change or update, so you can add additional gifts to the Major Project or increase the percentage or money amount by amendment or codicil. The California-Hawaii Major Project, Inc. is a 501(c)3 corporation so, depending on the value of your assets at death, a gift to the Major Project could reduce or even eliminate Estate Taxes. For right now, the Federal Estate Exemption amount is relatively high...but that could change.

Adding the Major Project to your Trust or Will also insures that there is a legacy fund for future generations of children who will need our assistance, Keep in mind that it's not only Elk members who can donate. You are already familiar with our Major Project, our Therapists, and have probably shed a tear or two when our Theme Child is introduced every year. Perhaps you have a friend or family member who is not. Spread the word to them that their gift will assist the children served by the Major Project far into the future.

Ryan and Clair Blais were blessed with three beautiful daughters—Nyah, Kiera and Halle. They were a happy family but had always hoped to adopt a child. In time, they adopted Tristan, and two years later they adopted Isaiah, who is Tristan's biological brother. Life was very busy in the Blais household. When Isaiah was two, Ryan and Clair found out that another biological sibling needed a home. Ellie was born small for her age and had heart defects, lung disease and difficulty with feeding. This did not deter the Blais' from wanting to adopt her. Ryan and Clair brought little Ellie home a few days after she was born and she was welcomed with open arms by all five kids.

At less than three months of age, Ellie was referred to the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project for Physical Therapy. Her physician was concerned because Ellie had increased muscle tone and contractures of her joints. Denise Wilson was able to meet her right away to start Physical Therapy. Mom was given a home program to work on flexibility.

Ellie was seen for physical therapy only a few times before she was admitted to UC Davis Medical Center and underwent two open heart surgeries. She was hospitalized for over four months as she recovered from the surgeries. Due to all of the invasive procedures that Ellie went through, she required a nasogastric tube for nutrition. She was unable to wean from supplemental oxygen and was sent home on continuous flow through a nasal cannula. Shortly after returning home, Ellie was able to resume physical therapy with the Major Project. Her parents were grateful to have in home therapy because Ellie was so medically fragile.

Ellie made good progress learning to sit, roll and crawl. Physical therapy was challenging at times, since Ellie was very sensitive to her joints being moved and having her muscles worked with. At 10 months of age, genetic testing confirmed that Ellie had Myhre's Syndrome. Some of the traits of this genetic condition

that Ellie exhibits include tight muscles, pulmonary hypertension and hearing loss, all which get progressively worse over time.

Since Ellie was on blood thinners, her parents were very apprehensive when she was moving around her environment, and especially when she was learning to walk. If she were to fall, it could be life threatening, so they purchased a helmet to help protect her head.

Ellie had developed oral defensiveness during her earlier hospitalization and despite her mother's considerable efforts would not resume eating or drinking by mouth. Therefore at 18 months of age, Ellie underwent surgery for a gastrostomy tube placement for nutrition.

Today Ellie's physical therapy goals are to maintain flexibility and work on functional activities. Denise makes sessions fun by using toys that Ellie likes. For shoulder flexibility, she has Ellie reach for them above her head. To increase leg strength, Ellie does repetitions of sitting to standing from a bench, and for balance, Ellie steps over a hurdle. These are just a few examples of exercises done during her PT sessions and home program.

At almost five years of age, Ellie was hospitalized at University of California San Francisco Benioff Children's Hospital because of declining health. She underwent yet another open heart surgery. Recovery was slow and Ellie lost some mobility due to prolonged bed rest. She was discharged after about three months. PT through the Major Project was resumed, and although active and playful, Ellie now required frequent rest breaks.

In March of 2020 home appointments were stopped, therapy soon resumed through telehealth due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Ellie enthusiastically greets Denise each week and readily



participates in the sessions. Denise uses computer programs designed for telehealth. Ellie picks from a variety of exercises and tries to mimic the images shown on the computer screen. Initially, she needed a lot of physical assistance to do the exercises. However, Ellie persevered and this has gradually improved and Ellie requires less help now.

The results of a recent heart catheterization confirmed that Ellie still has severe pulmonary hypertension. This was a sad reminder of the fragility of Ellie's condition. The whole family dotes on Ellie and it is obvious that she is the apple of her family's eye. Mom describes Ellie as funny, inquisitive and full of joy. She loves puzzles, music and movies. She's a big fan of "Frozen," but loves all the Disney princesses. Despite her physical limitations, she loves to dance and she tries to sing.

Mom is very busy tending to Ellie's needs, along with the demands of five other children, but always does so with loving care and a positive attitude. Ellie's mother appreciates the consistency that the Major Project has provided Ellie. The continuity of care throughout the years has been a blessing, since Ellie has difficulty dealing with changes in routine. It has been essential to have in-home therapy to avoid exposure to germs. The California-Hawaii Elks Major Project has filled this need.

Ellie's mother commented hat Denise has seen Ellie since she was three months old until now, at age six. She has built a great relationship with her. Ellie trusts Denise and feels safe with her. I appreciate the Elks program. It's a great program. We are grateful that the Elks reach kids in our community and that their funds have directly reached our family and little Ellie."

Denise explains that Ellie is a joy to work with and her time with Ellie is the highlight of her week. She feels privileged to have had the opportunity to represent the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project and provide physical therapy for

Another CHEA Most Valuable Student Scholarship contest has been completed and the news is good. Even with the shroud of COVID-19 hanging above our heads, I am happy to report that the CHEA Scholarship Committee reviewed and judged more scholarship ap-

plications than in recent years. This year the Scholarship Committee processed 361 applications from across California and Hawaii. Of those 361 applications, 77 were sent on to the Elks National Foundation in Chicago for nationwide adjudication. News of how well CHEA did nationally should be arriving soon. I would be remiss in not acknowledging two key people who work diligently to keep the MVS process running smoothly: Cindy Mowrey and Charisce Williams of the CHEA Office. These two ladies worked tirelessly behind the scenes to administrate the judging and distribution of awards for the CHEA MVS Program.

The California-Hawaii Elks Association reviews and judges a possible 378 applications each year, more than any other State Association in the Order. You will note that this number is greater than that of the applications actually judged, so what happened? Following their judging at the District Level, students whose applications are sent on to CHEA must provide a copy of their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form and a certified transcript of grades to be attached to their application. This year, 17 students failed to complete this necessary step and were disqualified from judging. I have heard from members who are involved in the scholarship program that they feel they are not able to be as involved as in years past. There is a need for follow up with students on this necessary task, and that need provides an opportunity for Member involvement. The Scholarship process begins with soliciting applications, and ends with ensuring that each student has crossed each "t" and dotted each "i" so that they can received their deserved and needed monetary award.

Congratulations Elks Members, on a job well done. Thanks to your generosity and dedication of time, treasure and talent, another cadre of students will be aided in their pursuit of higher education. The future of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and the future of the United States of America will rest in their hands. Know that you have played a part in securing a bright future.




