The Open House Celebration, co-hosted by CHEA President Jay Larkins, and First Lady Ginger, gave attendees a hands on demonstration tour during the making of the Therapy Kits for our Veterans with the Elks donated leather. Nearly 100 Elks took the guided tours. Each member could see up close, first-hand, staff creating and packing the therapy kits that were being shipped out to our Veterans. Westchester Lodge 2050 used a Focus Grant to pay for a Whale Watching experience out of Marina Del Rey for the U.S. Vets in Inglewood. Next month, Exalted Ruler Dave Hessler is organizing a fishing trip for Veterans, using the Focus Grant as well.

San Rafael Lodge 1108 has made a positive impact in local veterans lives with the \$10,000 ENF Focus Grant. Formerly homeless veterans are usually placed in Section 8 Housing with the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development as well as VA Supportive Housing programs. Veterans' Committee Chairman Peter Behr (himself a Navy vet), discovered that veterans are provided with a basic bed, at most, in their new apartments. Taking veterans shopping for bedding and kitchen essentials with the \$300 Welcome Home Grant, local Elks have been donating furniture, kitchenware and dishes. With the ENF Grant, it's now possible to supplement these donations, and also provide small appliances such as microwaves, mixers and other essential needs, so veterans can really feel at home!



Hello my fellow Elks.

This will be my last article as Elks National Foundation Chairman. It has been an interesting two years. I had two goals to accomplish when I started as ENF Chairman. The first, to meet \$1,000,000.00 in total donations, the second to have 100%, all 167

Lodges, participate in donations to the Elks National Foundation. My first year COVID struck, Lodges shut down, members stayed home, and fundraising activities came to halt. We had to pivot from fundraising at most of our Lodges to becoming a focal point in some communities providing meals and assistance where needed. We answered the call using CIP Grants of all types to show Elks Care, Elks Share. However, the funds continued to come into ENF, due to Fidelity Club recurring donations and others, and we were still able to raise still **\$740,934.19**. We were only down **27%** from the prior year's totals. I see that as a success considering all that went on during COVID.

Now came the 2022 Lodge year the COVID restrictions started to end and some Lodges were opening. I only hoped that most Lodges were able to come out of COVID, hit the ground running, and pivot from service and assistance when it was available to do so, once again becoming the Lodge where members could come and associate with their fellow members and enjoy camaraderie and fellowship. Fundraising activities and events started to take place, and by Mid-Term we had an amazing \$657,402.42. I realized at that time that we were going to surpass last year's totals, and I was hoping that we could potentially make my first goal of meeting \$1,000,000.00 in total donations, and maybe surpass my predecessors total of \$1,015,223.50. All that would be left was my second goal of having 100%, all 167 CHEA Lodges, participate in donations to the Elks National Foundation.

Well at this time, I am happy to report that you the members, lodge chairs, district chairs, and fundraising committees did not disappoint. Through your great and generous efforts, we were able to raise \$1,291,174.43 for a per-capita of \$15.68 per member. Yes \$1,291,174.43. OUTSTANDING!!!

Where is my second goal of having 100% of all 167 CHEA Lodges achieved? I know it may not seem like much of a goal, but for those who have been Chairman before me, you know what I mean. Due to the hard work of two individuals, who know who they are, with their diligent effort, to have reached out to those two Lodges who had not donated in many years, and worked hard to get donations to achieve this. I owe those two individuals a big THANK YOU! THANK YOU!

One district has stood out among all the other 19 this year. They are having a great year with membership and ENF too. As far as total donations the **ORANGE COAST DISTRICT** was out of control!! Their district of eight lodges was able to bring in a total of \$340,796.22 in total donations and four of their Lodges are in the Top 10.

By now, hopefully, you are all beginning to pack, are getting ready and are very excited to be headed for the CHEA Convention in Fresno May 18th through May 21st. We hope all of you will be there on Saturday morning to celebrate with Cora and I during the Exalted Ruler's March when we finally break the \$4,000,000 barrier!

So why am I so optimistic? Because our numbers are looking so very good. The donations that have reached the Fresno Office from all the various Lodges in both California and Hawaii in this Fraternal Year are \$1.6 million with a per capita \$19.24. At the same time in 2021, the contributions were \$811 thousand with a per capita of \$12.49. That means this year we have seen a 95.3% increase of \$775 thousand with a per capita increase of \$6.75. That is outstanding. Thank you, thank you, thank you!

But what about 2019 when we raised the \$3.9 million and missed \$4,000,000 by such a small, small amount? Well, this year's contributions are up 49.5% or \$525 thousand over the same time in 2019. I am so optimistic! It's time to get excited.

Our booth will be up and running throughout the Convention until Friday morning. We will have many, many prizes to win including a 55" TV. We will begin drawing numbers as soon as possible after 11:00 a.m. Please try to be present to claim your prizes, or have a friend present to pick up your prizes or at the very least, have your cell phone turned on to receive a notification from our dedicated Prize Ambassadors' phone call. We will be gathering at the entrance to the Convention Center directly across from the Double-Tree at 6:30 a.m. Last time in Fresno, it rained on us. Again, my optimism says that will not happen this year.

Walnut Creek Lodge 1811 was contacted by Martinez VA Supervisor Heather Worobey, and asked if the Lodge could help them with nineteen veterans all moving into an apartment complex on the same day.

Denise Silva coordinated getting beds, used furniture and household goods for all nineteen veterans. Denise enlisted additional help from Pittsburg Lodge 1474, the Vietnam Veterans Association, Marathon Petroleum and a few veterans. A total of 26 volunteers helped make this a huge success!



Introducing Penelope, this year's California-Hawaii Elks Major Project Theme Child. Penelope was born 8 weeks premature in September 2019, with underdeveloped lungs and a diagnosis of Trisomy 21, which is a chromosomal anomaly commonly known as Down Syndrome. Penelope faced many challenges after birth. Before she was able to come home in November 2019 she remained hospitalized for 2 months while her lungs continued to develop. Not long after being discharged from the NICU she began to exhibit signs of a cold. Just two days before Christmas she was admitted to a local hospital and was diagnosed with respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). Her condition worsened and on New Year's Eve 2019, Penelope was airlifted to the UC San Francisco Benioff Children's Hospital. She was diagnosed with Pulmonary hypertension and a cardiac malformation and was admitted for nearly a year. While in San Francisco, Penelope was intubated and had a G-tube placed for non-oral feeding. Her family secured an apartment in San Francisco allowing them to stay close and spend as much time with her as possible. Penelope was unable to return to breathing without assistance therefore a tracheostomy was performed. In December of 2020 she was finally released to go home.

Back at home with her parents and older sister Jena, Penelope required full time care. She was on a ventilator twenty four hours a day and continued to be fed solely via her G-tube. Her immune system was not kicking in which left her extremely susceptible to any illness she was exposed to. Her family had to be very diligent with regards to preventing exposure to community borne illness. Even visits with other family members, including her sister and brother-in-law, Devin and Kyle, who live out of town, were kept to a minimum to protect Penelope as her health remained fragile. When Penelope was first referred to the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project for Occupational and Physical Therapy, the services were being provided via Telehealth on the Zoom platform due to Covid. This was an ideal model of service for Penelope, allowing her to begin Physical and Occupational Therapy services without any unnecessary added exposure.

Occupational Therapist, Michelle Allen, and Physical Therapist, Lea Nibur, began working with Penelope and her family in January of 2021. Michelle's primary focus points were on fine motor skills and feeding. Lea's focus was on gross motor skills. At this time, Penelope at 16 months of age, was just beginning to sit on her own. She required assistance to get up to a sitting position from her tummy or her back. She could lie on her tummy, but couldn't push up onto her hands and knees. Penelope played with toys in one hand, but did not pass the toy between her hands and she didn't use her two hands to bang her toys together as toddlers often do. She was being fed primarily via her G-tube, and although she accepted small amounts of purees by mouth and minimal liquids with an open cut out cup, most spilled out of her mouth. Despite these limitations she was quick to smile, loved to play peek-a-boo, and reach for her Mom's face, and always had a sparkle in her eye.



Over time, with guidance from Michelle and Lea, Penelope's family learned techniques and exercises to help Penelope gain strength and skills. Penelope has learned to get herself up from the floor to sit with perfect balance. She can now play and crawl on her hands and knees, and pull herself up to her knees using the living room furniture. She likes to pick up her toys and put them into a container, stack her blocks, and play with her doll. She enjoys turning the pages and pressing the buttons of her musical board books, especially her "Frozen" story! Penelope plays with toys using both hands now, and brings those toys together in each hand with a beautiful clap-clack-clatter to make music of her own.



Penelope has begun eating much more by mouth. She still receives homemade whole food blends through her G-tube, however under Michelle's guidance, Penelope has substantially increased her oral feedings and is replacing whole and partial meals daily by mouth instead of through her G-tube. Penelope eats a variety of foods by mouth from yogurt to sausages, but especially loves popcorn!

As Penelope's strength has improved, so too has her health. She no longer requires the ventilator during the day while she is awake. She receives monthly infusions of antibodies to boost her immune system. Last April, Lea was able to begin working with Penelope in her home safely with the use of proper personal protective equipment. Penelope continues to see Michelle via Zoom due to the geographical distance between them. However, Michelle has been lucky enough to see Penelope in person on occasion when she was visiting her medical team in San Francisco.



Penelope is a shining example of what the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project serves to accomplish! The therapists who are part of this project are honored to offer their skills and expertise to help children, like Penelope, develop skills, obtain equipment, and learn strategies so that they can walk, talk, see and play!

DEA PLAN ADDRESSES ODs, VIOLENCE

The Drug Enforcement Administration has announced a new initiative, Operation Overdrive, aimed at fighting the rising rates of drug-related violent crime and overdose deaths plaguing American communities.

Last fall, DEA used national crime statistics and CDC data to identify hot spots of drug-related violence and overdose deaths across the country, in order to devote its law enforcement resources to where they will have the most impact: the communities where criminal drug networks are causing the most harm.

Launched in February, Operation Overdrive uses a data-driven, intelligence-led approach to identify and dismantle criminal drug networks operating in areas with the highest rates of violence and overdoses. DEA, working in partnership with its fellow federal,

state and local law enforcement agencies, has mapped the threats and initiated enforcement operations against those networks in 34 locations across 23 states in the initial phase of Operation Overdrive.

Today, the United States faces an unprecedented overdose epidemic claiming 275 lives every day. Violence, often associated with drug related activity, is also rising sharply nationwide: in 2020, homicides increased a record 30 percent, and 77 percent of the murders in the United States were committed with a firearm. In 2021, DEA and its law enforcement partners seized more than 8,700 firearms connected to investigations of drug trafficking organizations.

Operation Overdrive revealed alarming trends about the networks that DEA has mapped. The vast majority of identified criminal drug networks are engaged in gun violence. A majority of identified criminal drug networks sell Fentanyl or Methamphetamine. And almost all of the identified criminal drug networks that sell those deadly synthetic drugs (Fentanyl or Methamphetamine) are also involved in violent gun crimes.

"DEA's objective is clear," said DEA Administrator Anne Milgram. "DEA will bring all it has to bear to make our communities safer and healthier, and to reverse the devastating trends of drug-related violence and overdoses plaguing our nation."

Kent Gade, National Director of the Elks Drug Awareness Program noted: "Last year, the DEA confiscated enough Fentanyl off the streets to kill each and every American citizen. If this doesn't scare you, nothing will. There's still so much more on the streets. We applaud the effort of the DEA and if your city or Lodge is in one of the 34 locations, you need to sit up and take notice. Get your DAP committee involved." At the end of the CHEA Convention in May, John will be taking over as CHEA DAP Chairman. John is a PDDGER and a member of Duarte Lodge. I am convinced that John will do an outstanding job working with the DAP Chairmen and ready to answer you questions about the Drug Awareness Program.
