With his motto, "*Elks Make Dreams Come True*", Jerry, his wife Bonnie, and their VPs, the "Broadcasters", traveled California and Hawaii, spreading the stories of all the good works of CHEMPI. Jerry also served as CHEA's Grand Lodge Housing Coordinator for 25 years.

Jerry was quoted during his President's year as saying, "I'm not serving, I'm having fun! When you see a child who can walk, talk, see or play because of the efforts of our organization, that's what it's all about."

Keeping Your Major Project Donations Safe

Fraud is an unfortunate reality in the world today. Check fraud is especially high as they are easy to identify in their mailed envelopes and easily altered once obtained. Recently, one of our Elks Lodge's checks was sent in a window envelope, mailed directly at the Post Office, was stolen, altered, and cashed at the bank. We would like to prevent fraud wherever possible.

When mailing a donation check, please place it in a solid, enclosed envelope. Please do not write "Donations" anywhere on the envelope. This will make it less obvious that a check is enclosed.





March 23, 2006, the Association & Major Project hired Cindy Mowrey as Secretary to answer phones and to work with the donations, scholarships and Association Convention preparation. Fifteen years later and she is officially called Administrative Assistant II but she has unofficially earned the title of "Elks Donation Expert". In her 15 years, she has perfected the process of receiving, processing, and acknowledging donations while processing over a gazillion donations, answering phones and everything else she does. We, in the CHEA/Major Project office, believe she could process them in her sleep!

MVS Scholarships...a hair-pulling event of a good time! Cindy also processed the MVS CHEA Scholarships and CHEMPI Scholarships Undergraduate Scholarships for Students with Disabilities. A lot of good times, a lot of memories and a lot of friends were made while working with the Elks.

Since Cindy began in 2006, the donations continued to grow so much that her position became a Full-Time position working exclusively with donations. For example, in 2010 Century Club donations totaled \$217,153 vs. \$335,036 in 2022 and 52 Club donations totaled \$70,717 vs \$96,044 in 2022. The Exalted Ruler's March in May 2010 totaled \$3,073,705 vs. May 2022's total of \$4,497,106. All of these increases mean more money to assist our Major Project to help the kids while increasing Cindy's workload. The Elks have been very generous over the years and she has been a very dedicated employee.

Last year, the CHEA/Major Project office installed a new phone system. The best part now being we have a new employee called "Auto Receptionist" and Cindy has been able to dedicate herself to working exclusively with donations. In her zest for donations Cindy has burned up at least three computers and five printers!!!

When Cindy started in 2006, her hair was blond, but you guessed it, she now has a beautiful head of gray hair. We're not sure if it is, well, just age, or is it all those donations? But we asked Cindy to hang on for just five more years so she could receive a 20-Year plaque but as much as she loves us, she said an emphatic "NO" and has decided to hang up her "Donations Expert Hat" and retire to the beautiful state of Washington where she will be able to sleep in, walk on the beach, even watch TV all day if she wants to...or, just do nothing...No more dreaming of donations!!! We will miss her strong work ethic, dedication and loyalty to the Association and Major Project, as well as her friendship, as we wish her well in her retirement!

Army of Hope

Just as the Elks/Wounded Warrior project assists injured veterans of the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan, the Elks' "Army of Hope" assists families of Military Reservists and National Guard who have been called to active duty during these times of crisis. The response from members and non-Elks has been overwhelming. Government officials at the local, state and national levels have responded favorably to the initiative.

Adopt-a-Veteran Program

If you've ever been hospitalized, you know the loneliness and depression you can experience. Think how tough it must be for hospitalized veterans, especially those who are far from home or have no family. With that thought in mind, George Schwarz of Clawson-Troy, Michigan, Lodge devised a simple yet effective solution in 1980: the Adopt-a-Veteran program. His idea proved so successful that it was picked up by the National Veterans Service Commission in 1983. Last year, Lodges across the nation adopted 47,000 Veterans. The object of the Adopt-a-Veteran program is to take the place of family, to replace loneliness with hope, and to let the Veterans know we will never forget them.

In closing, Chair Rochelle Zenger and I commend each of you for all you do to help Veterans. Keep up the good work! Also, don't forget about submitting articles and pictures of your Veterans activities to Ted Olsen, CHEA Magazine Editor, he is always looking for new material!

The holidays are here, and many Lodges are working on baskets and donations that will never get reported. Who's documenting the time, hours, and money it costs to do so?

The Lodges who have waited all year to complete their Charity reporting, need to get started now. There is nothing like waiting for the last 2 days of reporting to try and cram in 12 months of events. This never works out well and most of the time ends up in an under-reporting situation.

Keep this in mind when reporting, if a charitable donation was made, even something as small as a "march on the pot" or "passing the hat", there was a meeting involved to do so. The Secretary takes attendance for your meetings, they know how many people were present and how much money was raised. Now average how many miles were driven by the unpaid Officers and Members present, add in the time spent and miles to get there. That's another entry to the Charity Book.

On average, Lodges across the USA have been reporting about a third of the actual contributions made all year long, therefore we ask you to update monthly! Secretaries rarely have the time to go backwards and make up for unreported contributions.

Is your Lodge Secretary too busy? Make this your 2023 goal if you are not already doing so, ask them to appoint CLMS access to the Government Relations Chairman to make all Charity Book entries and help carry the load.

Now, send a copy of all your donations in 2022 to your city council members and government agencies, after that, follow up with them quarterly in 2023! They work off of a regular calendar year and would love to know what your Lodge has accomplished in their community and across the State. We are a nonpartisan organization; all parties want to hear about our noble works!

Despite our best of intentions, once the glow of a fresh new year wears off, many people struggle to make good on their plans. Announce your intentions to your Board of Directors or House Committee and let them know of your new goals for the committee. In other news, the Lodge held a Soccer Shoot competition at Paloma Creek Park, with 83 kids who were showing off their skills! What a successful turn out!





The Most Valuable Student application deadline was November 14, 2022. Lodges have from December 2, 2022, until December 19, 2022, to complete their part

of the judging process. On December 28, 2022, the district judging begins and will end on January 11, 2023. Immediately after the district judging is completed the district's winning student's will be notified by an email from the Elks National Scholarship Committee that they need to file the required transcript and the FAFSA Report (Free Application For Student Aid). In early February 2023 we will conduct the CHEA judging of the applications.

Current seniors in high school, who are children and grandchildren of members of the ELKS, are eligible to apply for the Legacy Awards Scholarships. The application period started on September 1, 2022, and the students have until February 6, 2023, to apply online. The Legacy judging is done by the ENF Scholarship Committee. 23 Legacy Awards of \$4,000 each will be awarded to the California-Hawaii Elks Association winners. To apply, the students need to go to enf.elks.org/leg

Applications for the Emergency Educational Grants opens on May 1, 2023 and closes on November 1, 2023. Go to enf.elks.org/EEG for more information on this very important grant.

The California-Hawaii Elks Association offers a Vocational Grant. The Vocational Grant applications are open year-round. The Vocational Grants are intended for students that are seeking training or certification from a one or two-year training program. Students planning to transfer to a four-year school to pursue a bachelor's degree are not eligible to apply. For more information on the Vocational Grants go to chea-elks.org_or contact me, robertfarrens@msn.com.

The California-Hawaii Elks Association also offers an Undergraduate Scholarship Program for Students with Disabilities. This scholarship program is a financial needs-based and academic-use scholarship. It is intended for undergraduate work at an accredited community college, four-year college, university, or licensed vocational school. The funds cover academic expenses only, which includes tuition, books, lab fees, and on-campus room and board. The applications are available from November 15, 2022, until March 15, 2023. This is the month to remember, among other things, to thank our Veterans for their service and give thanks for all that we have in life. I also want to thank those of you who read the

BLT columns, I know that you do based on comments that I receive throughout the year. Vice Chairman, Lynn Glick and I are happy to chair this Committee, which helps to insure that the Major Project continues on.

This column is devoted to a "numbers game", that term brings up different meanings to a lot of us. To me it recalls my childhood (you probably don't want to know). A definition? The use or manipulation of figures, especially in support of an argument, or an illegal lottery based on the results of races. OK, but what does that have to do with BLT? One of our members contacted me a short while ago wanting to share some information with me. He and his wife established a Commitment Trust in late 2010, a long time ago. Their Commitment Trust has been paying the percentage amount (7%) out annually since then. You will recall that the percentage amount paid may come from income that has been earned or from principal when the income is insufficient. This is how their Commitment Trust numbers game has worked out. They have received payments of \$7,753.25 over the years, averaging about \$667 per year. This means that their Commitment Trust has been invested so as not to vary substantially due to smart investments made by the Trustee. I'm further informed that there is well over \$9,000 left in the principal of the trust which means that the Major Project will receive almost the full amount of the original donation when he and his wife have passed. Those of you who follow the stock market can appreciate market variances and what has happened over the past few years.

Still wondering about the reference to the "numbers game"? Well, it is a happy reference, an example of what happens within the structure of a Commitment Trust. It's a good thing!

Drug Awareness John McEntire, Jr, PDDGER • Chairman

Elks Lodges and Districts throughout the country have just gone through one of the busiest times of the year. During the month of October — National Youth Substance Use

Prevention Month — Elks searched for deserving Enrique S. Camarena nominees. There were 13 submissions for this prestigious award. In addition, the Elks held their annual Poster, Essay and Video Contests in conjunction with Red Ribbon Week. It's still not too late to encourage students, members' children and/or grandchildren to submit entries to their local lodges. The deadline to submit entries into the CHEA District DAP Chairman in your area is December 15, 2022. That will provide your chairman with the time needed to judge your lodge entries and submit their winning entry to the CHEA State Chairman for judging in January. Winning entries will be announced in the next CHEA magazine.

The Drug Crisis • Fentanyl

For the past year, confronting the Fentanyl crisis has been the top priority for the Drug Enforcement Administration. It is the deadliest drug threat faces this nation. It has been reported that over 150 people die every day from overdoses related to synthetic opioids like Fentanyl. In 2021, a record 107,622 Americans died from drug poisoning or overdose. Sixty-six percent of those deaths were attributed to synthetic opioids such as Fentanyl.

There is a difference between Licit (lawful) Fentanyl and Illicit (unlawful) Fentanyl. Fentanyl was first developed in 1959 and introduced in the 1960's. It is a potent synthetic opioid drug approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use as an analgesic (pain relief) and anesthetic. It is approximately 50 times more potent than Heroin and 100 times more potent than Morphine. Unfortunately, through theft, fraudulent prescriptions, and illicit distribution, Fentanyl overdoses and poisonings became a crisis. Most recently, Mexican cartels have been responsible for supplying most of the Fentanyl in the United States.

On September 27, 2022, the United States Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration announced statistics related to their One Pill Can Kill initiative. This data covered only the months of May through September of this year. As part of the initiative, more than 10.2 million Fentanyl pills and approximately 980 pounds of Fentanyl powder were seized. The amount of Fentanyl taken off the streets during this time was equivalent to more than 36 million lethal doses removed from the illegal drug supply. Additionally, 336 weapons were seized.

It is imperative that we, as Elks, note the rising Drug Crisis. According to the Ann Milgram, administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration, "Fentanyl is the single deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered. It is everywhere. From large metropolitan areas to rural America, no community is safe from this poison. We must take every opportunity to spread the word to prevent Fentanyl-related overdose death and poisonings from claiming scores of American lives daily."

Just two milligrams of Fentanyl, which is equal to 10-15 grains of table salt, is considered a lethal dose. Without laboratory testing, there is no way to know how much Fentanyl is concentrated in a pill or powder. Just two milligrams of Fentanyl, or the amount that could fit on the tip of a pencil, is considered a potentially lethal dose.

The Drug Enforcement Administration is advising the public of an alarming emerging trend of colorful Fentanyl available across the United States. In August 2022, DEA and our law enforcement partners seized brightly-colored Fentanyl and fentanyl pills in 26 states. Dubbed "rainbow Fentanyl" in the media, this trend appears to be a new method used by drug cartels to sell highly addictive and potentially deadly Fentanyl made to look like candy to children and young people.

"Rainbow Fentanyl-Fentanyl pills and powder that come in a variety of bright colors, shapes, and sizes—is a deliberate effort by drug traffickers to drive addiction amongst kids and young adults," said DEA Administrator Anne Milgram. "The men and women of the DEA are relentlessly working to stop the trafficking of rainbow Fentanyl and defeat the Mexican drug cartels that are responsible for the vast majority of the Fentanyl that is being trafficked in the United States." Brightly-colored Fentanyl is being seized in multiple forms, including pills, powder, and blocks that resembles sidewalk chalk. Despite claims that certain colors may be more potent than others, there is no indication through DEA's laboratory testing that this is the case. Every color, shape, and size of Fentanyl should be considered extremely dangerous.

The Elks and the DEA have various resources available to assist Lodges as they deal with the Fentanyl Crisis and other Drug Awareness related topics. Talk to your District or CHEA State Drug Awareness Chairmen for more information.

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Santa Monica Lodge 906 started Red Ribbon Week for drug awareness with a special event for the community. Santa Monica Police Officer Hassan visited with Jack, her bomb/gun detection dog, Deputy Sheriff Dana Camarillo (Ret) spoke about the dangers of illicit drug use, CHEA Drug Awareness Chairman John McEntire Jr., Girl Scouts from Troop 1325 prepared displays on drugs vs candy, drugs and mental health and the very popular "drunk goggles."

San Diego Lodge 168 in August, hosted Association President Brad Smith and First Lady Agnes at the Official South Coast District Presidential Visitation Dinner. Following the dinner, San Diego Lodge Drug Awareness Chairwoman Kat Kuttler PER, District Drug Awareness Chairwoman Patty Hamilton PDDGER, and CHEA Drug Awareness Chairman John McEntire presented Drug Awareness Awards to Tahlia Schilf, Sophia Lee, and Samantha Lee. Tahlia and Sophia won awards for 1st Place in the South Coast District and 2nd Place in the CHEA Drug Awareness High School Video Contest. Samantha Lee won an award for 1st Place in the South Coast District, 1st Place in CHEA, and 1st Place in the National Drug Awareness Pre-High School Video Contest. Their parents and Grandmothers were in attendance for the dinner and presentation.




