The 40th Annual Colorado River Classic Bowling Tournament is rapidly approaching. Elks bowlers and guests are anxiously dusting off their bowling balls and cleaning their shoes, in anticipation of coming to the Riverside Casino and Resort Bowling Lanes in Laughlin, Nevada. This year's tournament will be held on February 23rd, through the 25th, 2024. The weekend will start with our most popular new Friday Night, singles No-tap event. On Saturday, the bowling will continue with many squads of bowlers competing in the traditional 4-person (2 men, 2 ladies), tournament. During the weekend, there will also be Mixed Doubles No-Tap and Team Event No-Tap tournaments for those who love bowling and can't get enough of the fun!

The Colorado River Classic Bowling Tournament began years ago at the Edgewater Casino. The tournament continued at that venue until the Edgewater Casino closed their bowling alley in order to build their buffet. The tournament has been held in various locations over the years—including Bullhead City Bowling Alley, the Gold Coast, Sam's Town, and South Point, all in Las Vegas; and most recently, the tournament returned to its roots in Laughlin, NV. Some of our current directors were present and bowled at the time of the tournament's inception. Now their children have taken on the reigns of responsibility and are serving as officers so that the tradition will continue.

Historically, the SEDEBC Colorado River Classic has raised thousands of dollars for the California-Hawaii Elks Association Major Project. In fact, that is our sole purpose, which in turn helps children with disabilities to Walk, Talk, See and Play. Last year alone, the tournament raised \$10,000 for this cause. All of our officers and directors are volunteers, and 100% of our funds, after expenses, are donated to the Major Project.

The Colorado River Classic Bowling Tournament is a great event, and those who have attended in the past can't wait to continue "Bowlin' on the River." There are still a few openings left for this year's tournament. Plan to bring a team ... or if you want to bowl and don't have a team, reach out to one of our officers, and they will find a place for you to bowl. 

PGER John Malley envisioned a plan, "unite

the forces of the Order into a mighty army for the services of mankind" which resulted in the birth of the Elks National Foundation over ninety years ago. At Mid-Term Conference 2023 in Riverside, we honored and celebrated the legacy of the Elks National Foundation.

The mission of Elks National Foundation embodies the selfless acts of our CHEA Elks members.

- The volunteerism of our members, to help our veterans, youth, and community programs, is a testament of our ability and willingness to serve our communities.
- The creativity of Lodges, continues to amaze Kealoha and me, as we receive information of the creative ways Lodges are using our ENF grants. Programs such as, dictionary programs for early elementary students, activity programs for our veterans, and various programs to address homelessness. Year-to-date CHEA Lodges have successful applied and received \$703,000 ENF grants.
- Our Lodges, and their members, continue to fundraise to fund the important work we provide to our communities. As of Mid-Term Conference, in Riverside, our CHEA members have raised \$750,293.

Special recognition to the Orange Coast District, which leads all CHEA Districts in fundraising, year to date, with a grand total of \$180,358. This total represents 25% of the totals raised by all CHEA Lodges and there are only 3 other states that have raised more money than the Orange Coast District. Great leadership, Kealoha Arelliano their district funding chairperson.

We should never underestimate our smaller Lodges, Porterville Lodge No. 1342, has the distinction of being the second highest contributing Lodge in per captia giving for the United States, at \$97.22.

Kealoha and I, continue to encourage our CHEA Lodges to apply for ENF grants. As we mentioned during our Mid-Term Conference lectures, CHEA Lodges leave 25% of the allocated Community Investment Programs (CIP) unclaimed, because Lodges do not reach their \$4.85 per captia requirement, or did not apply for the grants. Hello fellow members.

I hope you all are enjoying the fall weather and enjoying time with family and friends!

A previous article was focused on the 3-Ts "Time-Talent-Treasure" highlighting that everyone has something to contribute. This article expands on the Time portion of the 3-T's. It is important to take time to get to know your fellow Elks. Next time you see a member you don't know, take a moment to say "Hello". Although it may not seem like it initially, most members joined the Lodge to meet new people, and to be part of a sense of camaraderie.

To get to know your fellow members, please consider these approaches:

- 1. Initiate Conversations: Start by introducing yourself and expressing genuine interest in others. Ask about their back-grounds, interests, and experiences within the Lodge. Take a minute to get to know the member you've seen in the Lodge a dozen times.
- 2. Attend Lodge Events: Participate in Lodge meetings and events. These events provide an informal setting for members to interact and connect. Who doesn't like to have fun, meet new people, and raise money for charity?
- 3. Join a Committee or Auxiliary: Our Lodges have so many great programs, and behind every program is a committee or auxiliary. Joining a committee or auxiliary is an easy way to meet others with a shared passion.
- 4. Listen Actively: When conversing, actively listen to what members outside your circle have to say. Listening with purpose, shows that you genuinely care about their opinions, and provide the best chance of looking at things from a different perspective.
- 5. Collaborate on Projects: Taking on a project can make anyone nervous, and the tasks can seem overly daunting. However, if you find another member to team up with when tackling a project, the end product is nearly always better, and you have more fun along the way.

Remember, building relationships takes time, so be patient. Everyone may not be as passionate as you are, and some may need to ease into getting involved. 

Change, Change, Change. Many years ago, I was told that the only thing consistent with the Elks Scholarship program was that it is constantly changing. I have found that

comment to be especially true this year. This year each of the top twenty students will receive \$30,000. There will not be a first, second, or third place award this year.

In the past it was mandatory that the student apply through the Lodge nearest his home. Now the student is given a choice of five Lodges to apply to based on zip codes. We used to score applications on paper, now you score the applications on a computer and the top Lodge applications are automatically sent on to the District Chairman. Exalted Rulers, it is extremely important that your Lodges have scholarship chairmen and that your Lodge secretaries have appointed your chairmen as the Lodge Scholarship Coordinator in CLMS. Your Lodge will not have any input on the Scholarship judging process if you do not have an appointed coordinator.

I am encouraging all Lodges and Districts to judge the applications. While it is possible to allow the applications to be judged by computers, when they reach the California-Hawaii Elks Association level they will be judged by humans. To give your students the fairest opportunity to receive a scholarship your Lodge needs to be involved in the judging process. At the California-Hawaii Elks Association level we will be using a judging format that has been used successfully for many years. I have made the information available to all of the CHEA District Scholarship Chairmen and have requested that they forward it on to every Lodge.

The Most Valuable Student Scholarship Competition Application was available online at elks.org on August 1, 2023. The deadline to have the application completed is November 13th, 2023. The Elks National Foundation awards 500 four-year scholarships to the highest-rated applicants in the competition each year. Seventy-three of the winners will be from the California-Hawaii Elks Association. The scholarship awards range from \$1,000 each year to \$7,500 each year The application deadline is November 13th, 2023. Lodge judging is from December 1st to December 18th, 2023.

In addition to the ENF National Awards, CHEA will be awarding two \$3,500 awards, two \$2,500 awards, two \$1,500 awards, two hundred and seventy \$800 awards, thirty-eight \$700 awards, thirty-eight \$400 awards, and thirty-eight \$200 awards.

Legacy Awards are \$4,000 scholarships, that are available to children and grandchildren of Elks members. There are twenty-three Legacy Awards set aside for applicants from the California-Hawaii Elks Association. The application process is open now and ends on February 5th, 2024. Applications must be completed online.

Emergency Educational Grants provide undergraduate college financial assistance to children of deceased or totally disabled Elks in the form of renewable, one-year grants of up to \$5,000.

The grant is for educational assistance only and is not intended to cover the entire cost of a college education. Please check elks.org for more information on eligibility and dates.

The California-Hawaii Elks Association provides Vocational Grants that are open to anyone residing in California or Hawaii, who is a citizen of the United States of America, and planning to pursue an eligible vocational/technical course resulting in a certificate or two-year degree and leading to employment opportunities. The program is open to male and female applicants who will be judged on an equal basis. While graduating high school seniors may apply, it is not limited to high school students-in fact, it is open to all prospective students who require training or retraining to compete in the workplace. The Vocational Grant is for one academic year, with an option to renew for one additional academic year. This grant may be used only for usual and required costs of student's course of study; that is, for tuition and fees, room and board (if living on campus) and books and supplies. Payment will be made to the school. Awards will be between \$500 and \$2,000 for an academic year depending on the length of the course.

The definition of an eligible program shall be comparable to that contained in the federal vocational legislation. That is defined as a two-year or less vocational/technical program culminating in a terminal Associate degree, diploma, or certificate, but less than a baccalaureate program (Bachelor's degree). Online and correspondence courses do not qualify. For more information, please go to the CHEA Website at: Scholarships California-Hawaii Elks Association (chea-elks.org)

California-Hawaii Elks Major Project, Inc. also has an Undergraduate Scholarship Program for Students with Disabilities. This scholarship program is a financial needs-based and academic-use scholarship. It is intended for undergraduate work at an accredited community college, four-year college, university, or licensed vocational school. The funds cover academic expenses only, which includes tuition, books, lab fees, and on-campus room and board. During the years in which this annual scholarship assistance competition has been in existence, the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project, Inc. Undergraduate Scholarship Program for Students with Disabilities has increased from five scholarships of \$1,000 to twenty to thirty scholarships of \$1,000 to \$3,000 each. Scholarship recipients may reapply each year. If qualified, they can receive up to a total of four years of assistance. For more information, please go to the CHEA Website at: Scholarships California-Hawaii Elks Association (chea-elks.org).

Government Relations

Greetings and Aloha!

It was great to see so many of you at the last cheer Mid-Term Conference in Riverside. I know many of you stopped by our table and

asked a lot of great questions, and I want to thank you all for your commitment to Government Relations. As I mentioned, the new Grand Lodge Government Relations manual is available at elks.org, under members only, then select manuals, then select Grand Lodge manuals. There are many changes to the manual, and the one-page event summary form is in the back of the manual on page 21. This is the item that I ran out of at our table after the committee reports on Friday. I recommend that you print just that page out, and place them somewhere in the Lodge, where your event coordinators can easily access them, fill them out for each event, and return them to either the secretary or your local charitable report coordinator for your Lodge, so they can be entered into CLMS. We are getting closer to my goal of 100% Lodge reporting. As of November 1st we have 14 Lodges, that have not reported anything yet through the first eight months of the year. There are only 5 months of this current year left, and it is a lot of work to try and do at the end of the year.

I am including these simple instructions every time, to assist with getting the reporting entered. Lodge Secretaries, you do not have to do this all by yourselves. Get some help! You can assign an assistant access to help with the reporting of our charitable works, to help offload some of the Secretaries burdens. They will only have to access to do reporting on local charitable event data, nothing else in CLMS.

Step 1 - Under Staff Tab in CLMS, Appoint Local Charitable Report Coordinator

Step 2 - Select name of individual on drop down menu, select Appoint Local Charitable Coordinator

As a reminder, Lodge chairman, there is a Government Relations report that is due monthly to the District Government Relations Chairman, who will the compile and send a monthly report to me and my Vice-Chairman, Alyssa Santos, copying their DDGER and AVP. It is also now included in the new Grand Lodge Government Relations manual if you need a copy.

Elks Lodges and Districts, throughout the country have just gone through one of the busiest times of the year. During the month of October -- National Youth Substance Use

Prevention Month-Elks searched for deserving Enrique S. Camarena nominees. From throughout the states of California and Hawaii, there were 24 submissions, for this prestigious award! In addition, the Elks held their annual Poster, Essay and Video Contests, in conjunction with Red Ribbon Week. It's still not too late to encourage students and members' children and/or grandchildren, to submit entries to their local Lodges. The deadline to submit entries into the CHEA District DAP Chairman in your area is December 15, 2023. That will provide your chairman with the time needed to judge your Lodge entries and submit their winning District entry to the CHEA Chairman, for judging in January. Winning entries will be announced in the next CHEA magazine.

The Drug Crisis Continues

Drug-related deaths continue to plague our nation, killing Americans at an unprecedented rate. Last year alone, it is reported that 110,757 people died from a drug poisoning, with Fentanyl and Methamphetamine poisonings driving this record increase. Fentanyl and Methamphetamine are more accessible and more widely available than ever before. Last year alone, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) seized more than 58.3 million pills containing Fentanyl and more than 13,000 pounds of Fentanyl powder. This equates to nearly 387.9 million potentially deadly doses of Fentanyl, that never reached our communities. The vast majority of the illicit Fentanyl, close to 90%, was seized at official border crossings. Most of the drugs that still entered the country were smuggled by people hired by the Mexican Cartels. Most of those people were legally authorized to cross the border, and more than half of them were U.S. citizens, according to immigration authorities.

Youth drug abuse is a high-profile public health concern, with at least 1-in-8 teenagers abusing an illicit substance in the last year. On the front page of DrugAbuseStatistics.org, key findings indicate that 50%, or half of the people 12 and older have used illicit drugs at least once. Drug overdose deaths in the United States since 2000, are nearing one million. To fight against this threat, the federal budget for drug control is over \$35 billion dollars. Fentanyl abuse statistics indicated that it remains the world's deadliest opioid, causing almost half of all overdose deaths nationwide. In fact, Fentanyl is a factor in more than half of overdose deaths.

On September 25th, and 26th, the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration hosted its second annual DEA Family Summit on Fentanyl, for families from across the country who have experienced the profound loss of a child, due to a drug poisoning. United States Attorney General Merrick B. Garland, and DEA Administrator Anne Milgram, delivered the opening remarks where the Attorney General announced \$345 million in grants to combat this drug epidemic.

The DEA also created a special exhibit, The Faces of Fentanyl, to commemorate the lives lost from Fentanyl poisoning. Anyone who has lost a loved one is able to submit a photo in their memory. The DEA Faces of Fentanyl Wall exhibit is located at DEA Headquarters, at 700 Army Navy Drive in Arlington, VA 22202. Visitors can view the wall Tuesday through Saturday, 10 am to 4 pm.

It is imperative that we, as Elks, note the continuing Drug Crisis. According to Ann Milgram, administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration, "Fentanyl is the single deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered. It is everywhere. From large metropolitan areas to rural America, no community is safe from this poison. We must take every opportunity to spread the word to prevent Fentanyl-related overdose death and poisonings from claiming scores of American lives every day."

The Elks and the DEA have various resources available to assist Lodges, as they deal with the Fentanyl Crisis and other Drug Awareness related topics. Talk to your District or CHEA Drug Awareness Chairmen for more information.

Buena Park Lodge 2046, using a Gratitude Grant, used \$3,600 to fund the purchase of school supplies and backpacks for the Buena Park School District.

Newport Harbor Lodge 1767 presented \$10,000 worth of kitchen equipment to, Provisions for Patriots, a year round program providing housewares to veterans, active duty personnel and reservists throughout Southern California, regardless of rank, discharge, branch or financial status.



Roseville Lodge 2248, supplemented with Lodge charity funds and an ENF Gratitude Grant, purchased 1,549 dictionaries from The Dictionary Project and distributed them to third graders in 21 schools, throughout Roseville and Rocklin.
